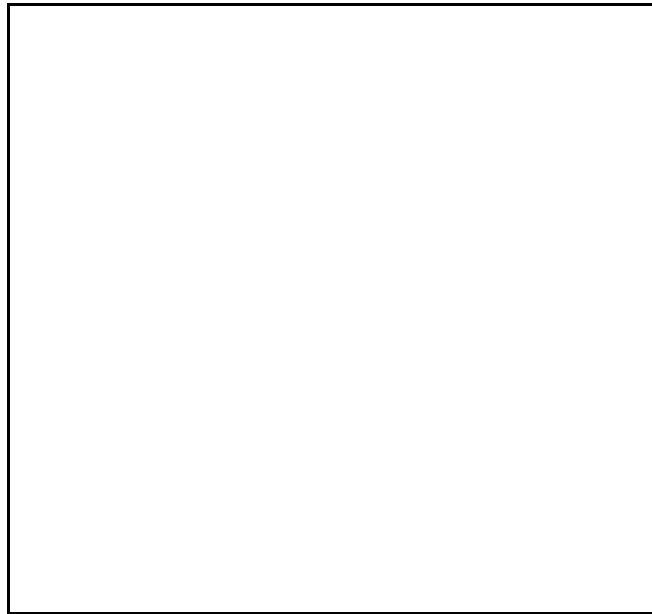

The purpose of this letter is to briefly inform you of the status of our unit and encourage you to drop by for a cup of Navy/ Marine Corps coffee anytime you are in the Austin area.

Our Unit strength now stands at 80 midshipmen and officer candidates. I know this is a much reduced battalion size than most of you are familiar with, but we still are a highly productive Unit and are ranked in the top 10% of all ROTC programs. The reduced size is primarily a function of the Navy's downsizing program and our inability to compete with the financial incentives offered by a number of schools to Naval ROTC scholarship students. Recently we have formed an ROTC Faculty Advisory Committee and one of its immediate goals is to find solutions to our problem of competitiveness.

This past year the Unit's performance was excellent; as a group they achieved an overall GPA of 3.1, were named the outstanding student group on campus in their competitive category and through several fundraising events they donated over \$5,000 to local charities.

At the Spring Awards Ceremony your Naval ROTC Alumni

Foundation presented \$500 scholarships to three of our most deserving individuals; Midshipman Robert Holguin, Midshipman Gin Kai and Midshipman Misty Roquemore. Also through your generosity the Battalion Commander, Midn. Mike O'Hare, was presented a Naval Officer's sword by Keys Curry, President of the NROTC Alumni Foundation.

The fall reunion has been set by the Association for 5 October. I know you will be hearing more on the details from the Foundation, but on behalf of my staff and the Naval Battalion I
